Easy access

Two hours away from Paris, Le Havre is situated at the heart of the *Baie de Seine* in the region of Normandy which holds some internationally famous places (Deauville, Honfleur, Etretat...)

Around Le Havre

Over an area of 20 000 hectares, the Community of the Suburbs of Le Havre (*CODAH*) gather together 17 towns (including Le Havre).

Less than 15 kilometres away from Le Havre, 16 towns and villages constitute the "Community of villages of Saint-Romain de Colbosc.

This territory, in the "Pays de Caux", puts on display the luxuriant traditional historic heritage of the area.

Le Havre, past

Le Havre de Grâce was established in 1517 by King Francis I of France after the silting-up of the ports of the Seine estuary, Honfleur and Harfleur. In 1820 and 1852, the city was enlarged, first thanks to the pushing back of the ramparts and later, to their demolition. A war port during the 17th century, successful trading with the Isles during the 18th century and emigration to America during the 19th century; all this contributed to a high demography and a fast

development of the city of Le Havre. The industrialisation beginning in the 1920's gives the first place to the city in Normandy thanks to its worldwide coffee and cotton market.

Le Havre, present

In September 1944, 80% of the city centre was destroyed and the port was completely devastated...It has taken twenty years for Le Havre to find a new lease of life. The lower part of the town is now the largest post-war unitary reconstruction site, with a surface area of 150 hectares. The unusual architecture made of concrete, created by Auguste Perret, offering antique columns and screen walls of oriental inspiration, opens Le Havre up on the sea. The lights of Le Havre skies are highly prized by impressionists and give an impression of wide spaces to the viewer.

> *On 15 July 2005: UNESCO added the city centre of Le Havre, rebuilt by Perret, to its World Heritage List.* Perret was a major 20th century architect and a true "poet in concrete", both traditionalist and innovative; he successfully rose to the challenge before him, seeking inspiration in architectural tradition and drawing on his own strong desire for modernisation to reinvent a unique, open town centre that is harmonious and resolutely innovative, across an area of 133 hectares. Le Havre city centre is the first European urban complex of the 20th century to be included in the World Heritage List.

City of Art and History

Thanks to this label, awarded in 2001 by the French Ministry of Culture, the city of Le Havre becomes the first city in France to obtain that distinction for a 20th century architectural creation.

Seaside Resort

Le Havre was granted the "Seaside Resort" title on 12 August 1999. At the heart of the city are a 2 kilometres long beach (sand and pebble) and a 4 kilometres promenade along the beach, designed by the talented landscape architect, Alexandre Chemetoff.

From April to September, the "Bains Maritimes" provide various services including: locker rooms, showers, toilets, bike parking lot, loans of special equipment to people with special needs so they can have access to the sea; lots of bars and restaurants offer quality gastronomy from the simplest to the most unusual or cosmopolitan of meals.

The resort allows the practice of several leisure activities: skateboarding track, the largest free open air skate park in France, volley-ball courts, children playground, boules fields, cycle lanes.

Blue Flag 2007

Le Havre was granted the Blue Flag, certifying the quality of the water since 1998.

Watersports resort

On 4 December 1999, the label "watersports resort" was officially granted to Le Havre from the association *France Station Nautique* at the *Salon de Paris*, an acknowledgement of 165 years of quality yachting.

Le Havre enjoys a quality beach; it offers many watersports activities and events.

The marina holds 1.300 berths and many assets: located close to the city centre, and only 200 kilometres away from Paris; accessible 24 hours a day.
